4. He enjoys participating in Dandelions - a flying club of military pilots who have flown all classes of planes and helicopters. He is active in Wings Over Wendy’s.
5. He has a great interest in computer clubs.
6. His call letters are KA6 TJK. On Okinawa, I used the call letters J9AAW.
