

Geri Fiorello

On Labor Day, Connie Hein brought in a surprise guest: Geri Fiorello. Geri has a unique history. The following are excerpts from her profile written by Laura Levinsky in the ENCINO ENTERPRISE September 6, 2019.

As a Marine during World War II, Geri was part of the first group of women to be stationed at Pearl Harbor after the bombing. There wasn't much to do when off-duty, so she organized a softball team among the women. This led to the creation of a league and her team went on to win the championship. She helped change the way women in the military were perceived.

After her service, she worked her way to Chicago where she went to college while also pitching in the All American Girls Professional Baseball League (AAGBPL). The movie "A League of Their Own" is based on the AAGPBL.

The league ended in 1954 but there were other leagues she played in. She was part of a movement of women being viewed as professional athletes.

In 1955 Geri was recruited to come to California to teach at Wilson High School. She transferred to Birmingham High in the days when it was still a six -year school. Her next move was to Pierce College. She was instrumental in building the women's athletic program at Pierce – volleyball, basketball, golf, gymnastics – all started and built into flourishing programs under Geri Fiorello's tutelage.

She convinced Adidas to supply athletic shoes to her teams. She changed the way women's sports were perceived and set in motion plans to continue the support for girls in sports.

Origins of the Star-Spangled Banner by Abe Hoffman

On September 16 Abe Hoffman discussed the origins of the Star-Spangled Banner and how it became the country's national anthem. During the War of 1812 the British attacked Washington, D.C., burned several public buildings, and ransacked the president's house before attempting to set fire to it. In making repairs the building was painted white and since then it's been known as the White House. As the British were getting ready to attack Fort McHenry, after which Baltimore would be invaded, Francis Scott Key, a prominent attorney and amateur poet, boarded a warship in an attempt to secure the release of Dr. William Beanes, who was wrongly accused of being a spy. The officers refused to release Beanes and kept Key on board, letting him know his effort would be discussed after the fort surrendered. This was on September 14, 1814, 205 years ago.

Key was an eyewitness to the attack on Fort McHenry, which went on all night as the British fired Congreve rockets at the fort. He noted how the rockets left a red glare across the sky and watched as the bombs burst in air. Every time the rockets exploded the sky was lit up, and Key could see the very large American battle flag still flying over the

fort. The next morning the British gave up the attack as Baltimore still was defended by Fort McHenry.

The episode inspired Key to write a four-verse poem he titled "The Siege of Fort McHenry," later renaming it "The Star Spangled Banner". It was published and widely circulated through the nation. Four months later the Treaty of Ghent was signed ending the war. Some twenty years later the poem was given a melody that was actually a somewhat bawdy English drinking song with references to love and wine. For the next ninety years or so people sang the song at public events, and there was a general assumption that the "Star Spangled Banner" was the national anthem.

In 1929 Robert Ripley surprised the nation in his "Believe It or Not" column that in fact Congress had never adopted it as the official national anthem. Some other songs, most notably "God Bless America" and "America the Beautiful" were offered as possible anthems, but in the end the "Star Spangled Banner" officially became the nation's anthem.

As an odd postscript, Abe noted that one of Key's sons, Philip Burton Key, was involved in an affair with Teresa Sickles, wife of Congressman Daniel Sickles. Although Sickles himself was known to be unfaithful to his wife, he became outraged on learning of the affair and confronted Key on Pennsylvania Avenue, shooting him dead in front of witnesses. A "dream team" of lawyers successful defended Sickles, arguing for temporary insanity and that Teresa Sickles was mentally incompetent and susceptible to the advances of Philip Key. Francis Scott Key had a large family, with descendants around to the present day. One of his cousins was the ancestor of Francis Scott Key Fitzgerald, who is better known by the name F. Scott Fitzgerald, author of The Great Gatsby and other famous novels.

Van Nuys Airport **A Few Interesting Facts**

In the heart of the San Fernando Valley, the airport stretches across 730 acres, with 8,000-long main and 4,000foot long runways, and 230,000 annual takeoffs and landings.

- The airport was built on 80 acres of walnut and peach groves and was named Metropolitan Airport.
- 1929 The Army Air Corps conducted the first demonstration of Air-to-Air refueling, flying from Van Nuys to San Diego and back for over 150 hours.
- 1940 With the outbreak of WWII, the U.S Government purchased the land for use as a military base. The same year, one of the airport hangars were used for the opening scene of the movie, "Casablanca", starring Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman.
- An Army Air Force photographer captured photos of a young Norma Jean Dougherty, who worked at the airport's assembly line of the Radioplane factory. She soon became known to the world as Marilyn Monroe.
- A California Air National Guard Unit was organized at the airport.
- The airport is purchased by the City of Los Angeles for a dollar and renamed as the San Fernando Airport.
- 1954 Captain Clay Lacy took leave from the United Airlines, to join the California Air National Guard at the airport where he flew the F-86 Sabre-Jet and was the

officer in charge of instrument training.

- The airport acquires a new name: Van Nuys Airport.
- 1959 The Sherman Way underpass is completed, and extends the runway to 8,000 ft the famous One Six'. Right
- 1964 Clay Lacy flew the first Learjet into the airport, shaping a new era in corporate air transportation.
- Clay Lacy is the founder and former chief executive officer of Clay Lacy Aviation, the first executive jet charter company in the United States.
- The airport become the busiest aviation airport in the world.
- 1990 The 146th tactical lift wing of the California National Guard leaves the airport.
- The vacated land serves as an operation area for the American Red Cross in the weeks following the Northridge Earthquake.
- 2004 The Flyaway Bus Terminal, a state-of-theart facility opens.
- May 19th, Wings Over Wendy's WWII 2016 Veterans and Supporters take flight on the "Flying Fortress" B-17 "Aluminum Overcast". Plane Peggy and son Tracy take flight the next day.
- September 20-22nd, the restored Superfortress B-29 "DOC" comes to Clay Lacy Aviation on tour of the West Coast.

Wings Over Wendy's member, Chip Stevens was chosen to represent the United States in a wreath laying celebrating the 76th anniversary of the Second World War (WWII) on August 1, 2019 at the monument on the picturesque and historical Kennedy Island in the Solomon Islands.

The island was named after former US president John F. Kennedy who was rescued on the island when the ship he commanded was torpedoed and sunk off the island.

Guests on the small uninhabited island included seven visitors from the US and Solomon Island national government representatives.

Note that Chip wore a Wings Over Wendy's hat while addressing the crowd.

The Navy Is the Fattest But Obesity Rates Are Up Across the Services

The Navy was the most obese and the Marine Corps was by far the least, but the overall rate across the military continued a steady increase, a Defense Department study found.

Marines, meanwhile, were hampered most by back and knee injuries, said the Health of the DOD Force report, which also looked at the services' rates of injury, sleep disorders and behavioral disorders.

More than 17% of military personnel were considered obese across DOD, up from less than 16% four years earlier, said the report, published in the August edition of the military's Medical Surveillance Monthly Report.

For the Navy, the rate was 22%, compared to 8.3% of Marines. The Army's rate matched the overall average and the Air Force was slightly higher at about 18%.

"This report highlights obesity as a growing health concern among Sailors," the study authors said. "Obesity contributes to hypertension, diabetes, coronary heart disease, stroke, cancer, all-cause mortality, and increased healthcare costs."

The findings follow earlier studies that have found dramatic increases in obesity among the services since 2001.

But while obesity had grown, overall rates of injury have decreased since 2016, the report found. As with obesity, the results were not the same across all the services.

The Navy fared the best with the lowest rates of acute and cumulative trauma injuries, and lower than average rates of sleep disorders and behavioral health diagnoses, such as adjustment disorder, depression and anxiety.

The Army, the largest branch, saw soldiers suffering the highest rates of injury, behavioral health disorders and sleep disorders, the study found.

Mission-specific training and operational requirements were likely to blame for the rate of injury that was about 26% higher than the DOD average, it said.

The study recommended the military look at the causes and prevention of behavioral health and sleep disorders, such as sleep apnea and insomnia, given their potential to reduce performance or lead to disability and separation.

The Air Force saw among the highest rates of injuries from repeated "micro-trauma," which caused pain and inflammation in backs, knees and other joints.

The Marine Corps, which is the smallest branch, also had the youngest force, which likely explains its relatively low rate of obesity.

The military data show more than one-quarter of troops over age 35 were obese, compared to less than 10% of those under age 25. Nearly 90% of Marines were under age 35, compared to about three-quarters of the other services.

But the Corps suffered higher rates of acute injuries, such as sprains and strains, compared to DOD as a whole. Back and knee joint disorders were the leading causes of limited duty.

Such injuries resulted in reduced deployability and increased medical separations, the study said.

To calculate obesity rates, the study used data for all servicemembers where height and weight were measured on the same day and cross-referenced that with birthdate, sex and branch of service information. It relied on body mass index, a measure of body fat based on height and weight, and excluded pregnant troops. A BMI of 30 or more was considered obese.

While less accurate than methods of direct

measurement, high BMI is linked to many of the same negative health effects of increased body fat, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has said.

As a growing trend in America, obesity has also made it harder for the services to find people physically qualified to serve

More than 20% of Americans age 12 to 19 and nearly 40% of those over age 20 were obese, the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey said last fall.

The WWII Museum Is Opening a Hotel in New Orleans

Travel + Leisure reports that the Higgins Hotel and Conference Center in New Orleans will be part of The National WWII Museum. It sits in New Orleans' Warehouse District and brings to life an era that has passed us by, immersing guests in the history and culture of the 1940s. "I think we're keeping the story alive, the American experience during WWII," James B. Williams, the vice president of sales for the The National WWII Museum, told Travel + Leisure, adding that 780,000 people visited the museum last year and more than 90% were from out of town. "We're trying to keep the story alive for the younger generation as well to tell the stories... We have the luxury of incorporating the museum experiences into the hotel." With this hotel, opening 75 years after D-Day, guests don't ever have to feel like they've left the museum. "The museum and the hotel share the same mission." Marc Becker, the director of sales and marketing for the hotel, told Travel + Leisure. "It's a deeper experience of the period that perhaps the museum by itself isn't able to give, that immersive experience."

At the hotel's Café Normandie, visitors can dine on French and Creole-inspired food while at Kilroy's Bar & Lounge, named for a wartime cartoon, Becker said they'll sip drinks from glasses that have a .30 caliber bullet embedded into them (the bullet of choice for Allied forces during the war). Simply walking through the hotel will feel like an extension of the museum itself with curated items from the museum's vault on display. Listen to someone play General George S. Patton's piano and admire an airplane propeller hanging in the rooftop bar as well as an oil painting displayed of the hotel's namesake, Andrew Jackson Higgins, who designed and built more than 20,000 boats in New Orleans used in battles during the war. While the hotel will undoubtedly bring you back to the era of WWII, the room amenities won't be quite so antiquated: rooms will feature modern aspects like 55-inch TV's. Keeping with the period theme, however, three of the hotel's suites will be named after presidents Roosevelt, Truman and Eisenhower, and will feature a Victrola record player.

This is the story of PFC Samuel Schultz, U.S. Army during WW II, 1942 -1945

Sam Schultz came from Brooklyn, New York where instead of attending regular High School he graduated from Brooklyn Trade School to become a Machinist.

He worked at a machine shop for 6 months then decided to enlist in the U.S. Army in July 1942. He spent three months at Camp Upton before being sent to Fort Eustis, Virginia for 9 weeks of Basic Training. After Basic he was shipped to Camp Edwards, Mass. where he became a Staff Sergeant in Supply for the newly formed 385th Anti-Aircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Semi-Mobile Battalion and the 385th got their Basic Training. After training the 385th was sent to Tennessee for maneuvers. There he was moved from Supply to Communication and reduced to PFC. Following the maneuvers, the 385th was sent to Florida. He was able to get a 9-day furlough to marry his girlfriend Ruth.

The 385th was transferred to Camp Shanks, NY for a couple of weeks before shipping out to the European Theater of Operations in February 1944 aboard the Cunard Line RMS Aquitania for an 8-day run to England out running submarines on the way.


After training in England, the 385th was sent to Utah Beach July 7, 1944 to protect the Normandy beaches from enemy aircraft. Fighting their way across France, Holland, Belgium and Germany protecting Army units at bridges and airfields on their drive to Germany. They participated in the Battle of the Bulge in St Trond, Belgium in November 1944

and fought their way through several towns in Germany such as Brunswick, Helmstedt, Ludwigsburg, Bremen and Eschwege to name a few.

When Germany surrendered the 385th was in Detmold, Germany. Sam was reassigned to the 31st AAA Brigade to be retrained to go to the Pacific. At the Pacific wars end, he returned to France. Assigned to Camp Twenty Grand in Le Havre in November 28, 1945. He returned to New York, Dec.2, 1945 for discharge at Ft Lee, N.Y. on December 7, 1945, on the Norway Victory.

After the war he and his wife Ruth moved to Los Angeles where he did cabinet making before his Father-in law helped him join the Electrical Union I.B.E.W. local 11 where he became a Journeyman in 1950. He worked for Sheinrock Electric about 17 years and then for the County of Los Angeles, for 20 years. Later he did Volunteer work at Kaiser Hospital in Woodland Hills and Panorama City for 26 years. Now he enjoys his Mondays as a proud member of Wings over Wendy's with friends and his Son Bruce

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

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
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
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
