On October 4, 2021 Dave "Bio" Baranek addressed Wings Over Wendy's via Zoom. Dave was born and raised in Jacksonville, Florida, where he grew up drawing airplane pictures and putting together scale model airplane kits. In his early teens he set his sights on becoming a jet fighter pilot or radar intercept officer. He attended Georgia Tech and participated in the ROTC to qualify for officer training, then entered the Navy in 1979. Shortly after he joined his first squadron he received the callsign "Bio," which many of his former squadronmates still call him.

He enjoyed a successful and satisfying 20-year career in the Navy, starting with assignments to F-14 Tomcat squadrons and the elite Topgun training program, and later assignment to the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the US 7th Fleet. At one point, he commanded an F-14 Tomcat fighter squadron, responsible for nearly 300 people and 14 aircraft worth about \$700 million. He completed his career with 2,499.7 F-14 Tomcat flight hours and 688 carrier landings. His logbook also records 461.8 flight hours in the F-5F Tiger II. (Continued page 3)

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While serving as a Topgun air-to-air combat instructor in 1985, he had the unusual experience of flying aerial sequences used in the film "Top Gun," starring Tom Cruise and produced by Jerry Bruckheimer and Don Simpson. He also served as a dialogue advisor on the project, and took some of the few available photographs of the movie's black F-5 fighters in flight.

He retired from the Navy in 1999, and works as a defense contractor. He is married and lives in Satellite Beach, Florida.

Throughout his Navy career and afterwards he was chosen to write articles, reports, and other products where compelling, high-quality writing is important. He wrote classified articles for the Topgun Journal professional magazine and also wrote and presented briefings to General Colin Powell and Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney when he was on the Joint Staff.

Dave answered many questions from the audience.



THE UNITED STATES NAVY 1915 - TODAY

On October 11, 2021, we celebrated in advance the birthday of the US Navy by showing a film from the History Channel on *The United States Navy*, 1915 to today.

The US Navy keeps the seas free and safe, provides a primary line of defense against attacks against our country, and plays a significant part in keeping the United States a strong force. The Navy goes all the way back to the Revolutionary War, as the Continental Navy, with only six ships. The Birthday of the Navy is known as October 13, 1775, when General Washington seized three British ships off the coast of Boston, which he used to build the fleet of the Continental Navy. Throughout the 18th century, the US Navy pushed British forces out of the United States. In the mid-18th century, the Navy began to sail around the world and establish a global presence by taking part in commerce and conducting expeditions for exploration and science. At the same time, the Navy remained in battle, helping in the Mexican-American war. During the Civil War, the Union Navy played a significant role in winning the war against the Confederacy.

In 1873, the U.S. Naval Institute was founded to technologically advance the Navy. Four new steel warships were built in 1883, and the Navy became an even more unstoppable force. The US Navy had a significant advantage in the Spanish-American War in 1898, leading to an easy victory. After this, the Navy continued to grow in power at a quick rate, partly thanks to President Theodore Roosevelt. On top of the strong battleships, naval aviation came around in 1910, which the Navy was quick to adopt. In World War I, the Navy served important duties, such as setting up anti-submarine minefields in the North Sea and sending battleships and naval aviation bombing squadrons to Britain and France. We also saw the first US aircraft carrier, the US Langley, in 1922. During World War II, the Navy grew nearly 10 times in size and once again played a very active part in winning the war.

From World War II until today, the Navy has become incredibly advanced. Today, the Navy handles an assortment of different issues around the world, in places such as Afghanistan and Iraq as well as Haiti, Somalia, Bosnia, and Kosovo. A significant achievement by the Navy in the 21st century was when Navy SEAL Team 6 tracked down and killed al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden in 2011. The US Navy even continues to assist scientific research and ocean exploration. Overall, the Navy is an extremely intricate, advanced, and strong branch of the United States military that has greatly enhanced the power of the United States.

Memphis Belle Her Final Mission (Continued page 4)

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The featured presentation on October 18, 2021, was the *Memphis Belle - Her Final Mission*

On May 17, 1943, the crew of the Memphis Belle, one of a group of American bombers based in Britain, became the first B-17 crew to complete 25 missions over Europe and return to the United States.

The Memphis Belle performed its 25th and last mission in a bombing raid against Lorient, a German submarine base. But before returning back home to the United States, film footage was shot of Belle's crew receiving combat medals. This was but one part of a longer documentary on a day in the life of an American bomber, which included dramatic footage of a bomber being shot out of the sky, with most of its crew parachuting out, one by one. Another film sequence showed a bomber returning to base with its tail fin missing. What looked like damage inflicted by the enemy was, in fact, the result of a collision with another American bomber.

The Memphis Belle documentary would not be released for another 11 months, as more footage was compiled to demonstrate the risks these pilots ran as they bombed "the enemy again and again and again—until he has had enough." The film's producer, Lieutenant Colonel William Wyler, was known for such non-military fare as The Letter, Wuthering Heights and Jezebel.

The film documented the bomber's last combat mission, the aircraft's post-war history, and details of the lengthy restoration to become a museum display.

WORLD WAR II in a Wild West Town

Our feature presentation on October 25, 2021, was a video titled *WWII in a Wild West Town*, a documentary based on interviews of Veterans and civilians who worked and trained at Pendleton Air Field during the WWII Era. The documentary also includes footage and stills of airplanes, equipment, and people pertinent to the film.

The film depicts the military aspects and accomplishments of the civilian and military personnel during the 1940s. It also shows how Pendleton Field brought many chance meetings, which resulted in marriages and friendships.

David Timmerman purchased the video while visiting the Pendleton Air Museum, Pendleton, Oregon.

Historically, the Airfield was the home base for the B-25 unit that the Dolittle Raiders volunteered from. The crews did not know their mission until they left the United States on a Navy aircraft carrier.

Another famous unit formed at the Airfield was the 555th Parachute Infantry Battalion, nicknamed The Triple Nickles, an all-black airborne unit of the United States Army during World War II. Though combat-ready and alerted for European duty in late 1944, the changing tides of the war resulted in a different assignment--jumping over the blazing forests of the American Northwest searching for Japanese balloon bombs, a job requiring exact skills and special courage.

The home team was up 2-0 against the Atlanta Braves when Jimmy Weldon came up to bat on DodgerVision between the 2nd and 3rd inning last Tuesday, and 50,000 fans rose from their seats to give him a standing ovation.

From his wheelchair on the clubhouse level, Jimmy smiled and waved to the cheering crowd as Justin Turner, Albert Pujols, Freddie Freeman, and players from both dugouts stood and joined in the applause.

"Thank you," the 96-year-old World War II veteran said. "Thank you."

It's a class gesture the Dodgers have been doing, recognizing a veteran at home games. It's becoming as popular with many fans as the seventh inning stretch, only instead of singing we get to cheer. And, who doesn't like to cheer at a ball game?

The Dodgers recognize the vets in prime time when all the seats are filled, not during pregame activities when half the fans are still in the parking lot. It's an important distinction.

This isn't lip service, just a nice gesture by the home team. This is for everyone at the game to see and hear — a "put down your beer and hot dog, and listen up" moment. There's someone special at the game today you should meet.

Last Tuesday, it was the Valley's own Jimmy Weldon — the "flag man." (Continued page 6)

The horror the young combat engineer felt when his squad helped liberate the Buchenwald Nazi concentration camp in 1945 has never left him. All those beaten, starving men to weak to stand, reaching up to him with tears of gratitude in their eyes, just wanting to touch his hand and say thank you. You don't forget that.(Continued page x)

How can this happen, Jimmy thought? Even now, he still can't believe it. It made him realize the only way to combat evil was with strength and love, he said. But how do you turn that into action when you get home? How do you get people to listen?

Jimmy became a successful motivational speaker, but still something was missing from his words. He could talk about the need for strength and love, but without a symbol, something everyone would recognize, it was just words he was spouting.

He finally found the right words in a speech a Rotarian had written in 1968, giving a powerful voice to the American flag. "They moved me to near tears," Jimmy says. "I thought imagine what a motivational speaker could do with those words."

He began to visits schools, corporate board rooms, civic groups and service clubs throughout Los Angeles and Orange counties, standing in the back of the room or auditorium as the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" began to play softly, and walking slowly to the front never taking his eyes off the flag.

"I am the flag of the United States of America," he begins in a deep, powerful voice that sounds like its been shot out of a cannon. "I rode with Ethan Allen and the Green Mountain boys at the Battle of Fort Bennington, and blazed the trail with Davy Crockett and Daniel Boone.

"I galloped up the slope of San Juan Hill with Colonel Teddy Roosevelt and his Rough Riders, and was carried through the Halls of Montezuma to the shore of Tripoli by the United States Marine Corps.

"History will never write my obituary for I am the stars and stripes forever. I am Old Glory. I am your flag. I am you!"

There's more, much more, and it's all very moving. Maybe the Dodgers will play it someday between innings next season. I think the fans would give up a little mariachi and rap music for another standing ovation.

Two of the greatest things you can say are "thank you" and "I love you," Jimmy would always remind me every time our paths crossed over the years.

Last Tuesday, thanks to the Dodgers, veteran Jimmy Weldon got all that love and thanks he's been handing out his entire life thrown right back at him when he stepped to the plate on DodgerVision in prime time, and knocked all those cheers right out of the park.



VA Will Hire 2,000 New Staffers as It Seeks to Cut Back on Increasing Backlog of Claims

The U.S. Veterans Affairs Department plans to hire 2,000 new workers starting this month to deal with an expected increase in backlogged claims which have tripled since the early days of the coronavirus pandemic last year, VA officials announced Wednesday.

According to a VA statement, VA officials hope the new hires will help them slow the backlog, which they expected to grow from about 204,000 overdue claims at the end of September to some 260,000 by the end of October. In addition to adding claims processors, the VA intends to mandate overtime work for its current processors to cut into its backlog, which it intends to pay for with emergency pandemic funding.

The backlog had grown from about 64,000 overdue claims before the coronavirus swept across the United States last year, as pandemic-mitigation efforts forced the VA to halt exams to evaluate disabilities known as compensation and pension examinations and slowed the Federal Records Centers' ability to provide documents.

The VA considers backlogged claims for benefits to be those that take longer than 125 days to approve or deny.

"VA is committed to ensuring timely access to benefits and services for all Veterans. This includes making sure Veterans who may have experienced adverse health effects from military related exposures can get access to the benefits they need," VA Secretary Denis McDonough said in a statement. "The hiring of new employees will help us resolve these claims more quickly."

The VA said the backlog has also been driven by recent court and Capitol Hill decisions granting new benefits to some Vietnam veterans who believe they were exposed to Agent Orange during the war in that country.

So-called "Blue Water" Navy veterans, who served on ships within 12 miles of Vietnam's shores, were granted a review of their claims last year. And, VA identified 70,000 claims it must review for new benefits granted by Congress, citing a link between <u>Agent Orange</u> with Parkinsonism, bladder cancer, and hypothyroidism.

Despite the expected increase in claims this month, the VA said it has decreased its backlog by about 14,000 claims since the end of August.

With the planned new hires and overtime authorizations, the VA expects to cut its backlogged claims to about 100,000 by April 2024, it said Wednesday.

DoD killed off Troops to Teachers program that helped thousands. Advocates want to revive it

Veterans advocates are scrambling for ways to revive the military's 28-year-old Troops to Teachers initiative after Defense Department officials officially closed down the transition assistance program earlier this month.

Originally administered through the Department of Education, the program was designed to help veterans interested in education jobs by providing up to \$10,000 of financial support and coordination with state officials on placement in schools in need of teachers. About 23,000 individuals have taken part in the program since 1993. The program costs about \$15 million per year.

But earlier this month, Defense Department officials announced they were ending the program completely and shifting resources to "higher priority programs more closely aligned to the National Defense Strategy."

Some current participants may still receive partial support through their individual states until May 2022, but defense officials will no longer be involved.

Pentagon leaders had signaled the closure as early as last fall, and had threatened to dissolve the program several times in past years. But until now, lawmakers had kept the program alive and continued to fund the operation, despite Pentagon objections.

Now veterans groups are asking Congress to intervene again.

In a recent letter to the House and Senate Armed Services Committees, officials from the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Student Veterans of America, Disabled American Veterans and Veterans Education Success urged lawmakers to reverse the Defense Department's decision.

"Studies have shown that Troops to Teachers educators fill thousands of vacancies in high-needs schools and subject areas; are more likely to not relocate after they are employed as teachers; are considered effective instructors; have high job and life satisfaction; and even have a positive effect on increasing student likelihood to serve," the groups wrote.

"Allowing the Troops for Teachers program to sunset would go against America's critical need to support our children's education."

The program costs about \$15 million annually. Senate lawmakers have already included the money and a mandate for four more years of the program in their draft of the annual defense authorization bill, but the House passed its version of the policy measure last month without any language on the program.

The two chambers will have to sort out a compromise in upcoming negotiations on the policy bill.

Meanwhile, the Troops to Teachers program will take in no new applicants this year, and will have to be fully rebuilt if it is reauthorized by Congress.

"There is a reason that Troops to Teachers has thus far stood the test of time: It is a signal to our service members that they can continue to serve in their local communities after hanging up the uniform, and that's a message that we need to sustain," said John Kamin, legislative associate for the American Legion.

"The Department of Defense might not think this is a policy priority, but it is certainly one for The American Legion."

The Senate provision on the program also requires defense officials to submit a report on the effectiveness of the program, to help determine whether it should continue past spring 2025. Negotiations with House lawmakers on the final defense authorization bill language are expected to start next month.

Outdoor events and the program are free to attend; however, reservations are recommended to attend the program.


