Similar to past years, the attendees met in the School Library and were individually interviewed by students from the school Leadership Group.



Into Flight Once More Documentary


The featured presentation on November 14, 2022, was the documentary *Into Flight Once More*, narrated by Gary Sinise. It brings the history of June 6, 1944, to the present through the lens of one squadron and their epic recreation

journey across the North Atlantic to Normandy for the 75th Anniversary of D-Day. Along the trip, we see interviews of some of the last remaining D-Day Veterans and younger generations of men and women who re-charted their path to honor their sacrifice and thank them for their service.

The journey took the film crew across the United States and on to Canada, Greenland, Iceland, Scotland, the UK, and finally to, France. It documented the history and significance of these locations during wartime and the challenges the crews faced in completing the journey.

One of the reenactment paratroopers in the video is Wings Over Wendy's member and local History Teacher, Franky Ortega

Jumping Into Normandy 75 Years Later

On November 21, 2022, the featured presentation was Reenactment Paratrooper and History Teacher Franky Ortega talking about his life and experiences in jumping out of a C-47 over Normandy, France, on the 75th Anniversary of D-Day.

Franky tells his story behind the scenes of the documentary *Into Flight Once More* we watch at the previous meeting. He starts his talk telling us about his background as a Yaqui Indian and growing up along the us-Mexican border as his mother worked in the fields picking crops on both sides of the border.

He graduated from UC Santa Barbra and decided to become a World History Teacher. His studies drew him to concentrate on WWII, and he joined a reenactment group. He attended Jump School in 2014 and in 2018, joined the D-Day Reenactment Paratrooper Team to participate in the 75th Anniversary of D-Day.

Franky then showed a slide presentation of his experience training and jumping into Normandy. He showed pictures of the WWII Airborne Demonstration Team training in Frederick, Oklahoma

They have 3 Jump Schools: one for Tier 2/3 in April and two for Tier 1/2/3 in July and October. All of the Jump Schools, except for April, are enrolled at max capacity.

For the Tier 2/3 short courses are for Airborne Veterans. The required training consists of BAR (Basic Airborne Refresher), Mock Door, and the T10R reserve.

The School studied the WWII D-Day jump locations and prepared for the trip.



Approximately 40 members of the WWII Airborne Demonstration Team (ADT) along with another combined 160 members of other jump teams converged at historic Duxford Airport, England on June 3rd. Most team members began their cross Atlantic flight in the early hours of June 1st in order to arrive on June 2nd and take a van caravan down to a 1500s Chateau De Plain Marais in the village of Beuzeville La Bastille by the Douve River in Normandy

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

On June 6, the team had to re-pack their parachutes for the jump on the 7th –Drop Zone C

Franky continued on about the ADT activities after the jump. He toured the area, the American Cemetery, Pointe Du-Hoc, Baily Bridge, Filthy 13 Monument, Hill 30 and many other sites the WWII Paratroopers fought in after D-Day.

Franky's passion for history began at an early age growing up with a hardworking mother, and although she dropped out of an American middle school to work as a farmworker, as a migrant son Franky realized what a privilege it was to be born in a country full of opportunity and risk. Living a constant life of change and often struggle allowed him to see the benefits of always challenging yourself. He has been teaching history for 14 years at several Los Angeles County high schools including more recently at the remaining buildings of the WWII Birmingham Army Hospital.



Abe Hoffman – History of Patriotic Holidays

On November 28, 2022, the featured presentation was by our esteemed historian: Abe Hoffman. Unfortunately, Abe tested positive for COVID, so his presentation was remote via Zoom.

Every Year two similar holidays are **observed.** Abe believes "**observed**" is more appropriate than "**celebrated**."They are Veterans Day and Memorial Day. It has been half a century since Memorial Day was made an official Federal Holiday in 1972, and only since 1978, Veterans Day, both holidays bounced around the calendar for many years. Veterans Day has its roots in a specific date, November 11, and somewhat surprisingly, so does Memorial Day.

Memorial Day originated after the Civil War, but with plenty of argument over who started observing the holiday and how it was observed. Finally, on May 1, 1865, a thousand newly freed African Americans and some white residents gathered in Charleston, SC to pay tribute to over

250 Union dead buried in a mass grave. The bodies were exhumed and placed at a proper burial after they had been buried near a race track.

Three years later, Governor John A. Logan, commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued a decree naming May 30 as a nationwide day of commemoration for all soldiers killed in the Civil War. Logan called the event "**Decoration Day**, as the date didn't fall on the anniversary of a Civil War battle. It my have also been picked as a spring day when flowers bloom.

Before Logan's observance, Southern women's groups started placing flowers on the graves of Confederate soldiers. However, different states held similar observances on other dates. As of today, nine southern states officially have a **Confederate Memorial Day.** Some pay tribute to Jefferson Davis on his birthday; even General Stonewall Jackson is similarly honored.

Southern variations notwithstanding, more than 27 states were observing Decoration Day, and by 1896 all the states sent representatives to attend a cemetery at Arlington National Cemetery. This went on for fifty years and was confined to the Civil War dead. After the two World Wars, Decoration Day was sidetracked until 1971, when Decoration Day was changed to Memorial Day.

This change was made because Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act of 1968. The law changed a bunch of previous holiday observances. Washington's birthday became Presidents Day, Columbus Day shifted from October 12 to the third Monday in October, Decoration Day—soon to be called Memorial Day—went from May 30 to the last Monday in May, and later on Martin Luther King's Day was the third Monday in January, and more recently, Juneteenth Day was made a Federal holiday. Labor Day was already fixed as the first Monday in September. Some dates will never be changed: Fourth of July, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day. Thanksgiving Day has a history all its own.

All these days had four things in common: 1) they created three-day weekends, 2) don't bother going to your mailbox, 3) it created opportunities for sales on everything from automobiles to mattresses, and)4 it gave federal employees a paid holiday.

Because of the number of versions regarding the date of Memorial Day, several cities have competed for the recognition of being the first to create Decoration Day. Boalsburg, PA. Carbondale, IL. Columbus, GA, Columbus, MS, and Waterloo, NY. LBJ decreed Waterloo the "official birthplace of Memorial Day."

Unlike Memorial Day, Veterans Day has a definite day in history. Both sides agreed on a truce in the Great War that all sides would cease fire on the 11th day of the 11th hour of the 11th month. Note that this wasn't the war's end—it just stopped the fighting.

Abe then talked about the history of World War I. (Continued page 11)

History of WWI

World War I, known as the Great War until World War II, was especially horrific for the numbers of the dead—12 million, plus 21 million wounded, a general term that doesn't mention amputated arms and legs and lives ruined by poison gas. In many ways, it was a stupid war that involved a pointless arms race and colonies dragged into a royal family feud.

The family feud stemmed from the offspring of England's Queen Victoria. She and her husband, Prince Albert, had nine children. It was the descendants of Victoria that helped bring on the Great War. One daughter married Tsar Nicolas I, so their son, the future Nicholas II, was one of Victoria's grandsons. Another daughter married Frederick William of Prussia, heir to what would be modern Germany. His father, Wilhelm I, was a military man who lived too long. When he finally died, Frederick William became the new Kaiser, and unlike his military father, he proposed a program of progressive reforms. Unfortunately for history, he developed cancer a few months into his rule and died, as did his reforms. His son, Kaiser Wilhelm II, the villain of the Great War, was thus another of Victoria's grandsons. He had a difficult childbirth in which the obstetrician used forceps that pulled him from the womb and permanently crippled an arm. The result was an embittered boy who bore resentment against his parents and a love for the military might inherited from Grandfather Wilhelm I. Wilhelm II enjoyed military parades and fancy uniforms and jealousy against the British and their military strength.

What resulted in the Great War was the fact that England's George V, Wilhelm II, and Nicholas II were first cousins, blood relatives. Wilhelm spent many summers with his Grandmama Victoria as a child and was fully bilingual. It would have been nice if the three cousins untangled their countries from the treaties that brought on the Great War, but they weren't up to the task. Several decades before the war began, England and Germany started a competition about which country could build bigger and better battleships with long-range guns. The battleships were called dreadnaughts. Although Britain ruled the waves, Germany was determined to even things up with England.

Along with the naval contest came significant developments and technology in new weapons. Both countries had colonies in Africa, as did France, Italy, and Belgium, and revolts by the native people were put down with the liberal use of heavy machine guns. The machine gun, unlike the rifle, was an impersonal killer. It didn't matter if a soldier was courageous. The machine gun would mow him down as quickly as it did a frightened coward.

The spark that lit the Great War was lit by Gavrilo Princip, 19 years old and a Serbian nationalist. He was

determined to assassinate Archduke Franz Ferdinand, heir to the Austro-Hungarian Empire. He had his chance when the Archduke and his wife came to Sarajevo, a city in Bosnia then under Austrian control, in June 1914. Austria blamed Serbia for the assassination and made unacceptable demands on the smaller nation. Germany's Kaiser Wilhelm pledged rashly to support Austria.

Despite the relationship of George V, Nicholas II, and Wilhelm II, they were not able to or capable of stopping the treaties their nations had made. Germany backed Austria, Russia backed Serbia, and France supported Russia. When the German Army marched through Belgium to get at France, England backed Belgium. Somehow Turkey got into the mix as an ally of Germany. And so began the biggest, most tragic war in modern world history. Opposing sides were named the Allies and the Central Powers. Italy signed a treaty as one of the Central Powers but early on broke it and joined the Allies. As did Australia, New Zealand, and Canada, colonies in Africa and Asia also entered the war.

During all this turmoil, President Woodrow Wilson insisted on neutrality. The war was not an affair for Americans as the United States had the Atlantic Ocean as a significant barrier to Europe's problems. Gradually, Americans came to support the British, who were more effective in producing propaganda than the Germans. Artists drew dramatic pictures depicting Germans as Huns, apes, and rapists of nuns. Wilson ran for reelection in 1916 with the slogan, "He kept us out of the war."

After Wilson's inauguration in 1917, circumstances dictated a new policy. First, Germany's submarines were resuming unrestricted warfare despite the controversy over the sinking of the Lusitania two years earlier, along with several other American merchant ships. A second reason, likely the main reason, was the Zimmermann Telegram, a message sent to Mexico's President Carranza promising support of a Mexican invasion into the United States to regain territory lost in 1848.

The United States entered the Great War, bringing fresh troops to go "over there" and aid the tired Allies. It took several months to train and equip the Army before the doughboys, as they were called, went to Europe. By the fall of 1918, it became clear to the German generals that they could not sustain their efforts to continue the fighting.

Both sides negotiated an agreement for a cease-fire, to take place on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11nth month—November 11, 1918, to stop the killing. A formal ending to the war was scheduled to take place months later in 1919.

The formal meeting was the Versailles Conference in France, with the four major Allies—the U.S., Great Britain, France, and Italy presenting a treaty that singled out German for the harshest punishment—reparation payments and loss of territory. (Continued Page 12)

The Treaty was so punitive that historians have noted that the Versailles peace treaty sowed the seeds for the Second World War. Wilson had idealistic ideas about resolving the conflict, his 14 Points including one that called for a League of Nations. When the Senate refused to have the U.S. join the League, Wilson went on an extended, exhausting trip across the nation to convince the American people to urge the Senate to join the League. Unfortunately, Wilson suffered a major stroke, and with his incapacitation, any hope of the U.S. becoming a League member ended.

People celebrated not the date of the signing of the Versailles Treaty but the date of the truce that became known as Armistice Day.

It took 27 years before Congress passed a law called Armistice Day, "dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be hereafter celebrated and known as Armistice Day, a holiday to honor American veterans of the Great War."

The holiday's significance was broadened after World War II and the Korean War. As a result, veterans service organizations urged the holiday law of 1938 to be amended by changing Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

In 1968, fifty years after the creation of Armistice Day and fourteen years after the name became Veterans Day, Congress passed the Uniform Holiday Monday Act, and Veterans Day was moved to Monday. However, Veterans Day was another matter unlike the other holidays in the law. The decision aroused the wrath of many states that continued to use the traditional November 11 date. From 1971 to 1975, confusion reigned as states and the Federal government honored veterans on two very different dates. Finally, on September 20, 1975, President Gerald Ford signed into law, moving Veterans Day back to November 11, effective in 1978. And that's the way it's been until now.

Worth noting was an odd effort to change the name again. The American Bible Society wanted to change the name to Mayflower Day since November 11 coincided with the date of the signing of the Mayflower Compact in 1520. Fortunately, the idea never caught on.

Cynics suspected that Congress had passed the Uniform Holiday Monday Act to give federal employees, including Congress, a paid three-day weekend. The three-day weekend has its companion in other artificial holidays—Mother's Day, Father's Day, and the other days when Hallmark and its competitors sell lots of cards—Halloween and Valentine's Day.

Fortunately, whether it's been called Armistice Day or Veterans Day, that day of the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month still reminds us of a point in time when the world came to its senses and called an end to a terrible war.

That reminder still is with us whether it falls on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Friday, according to the vagaries of the calendar.

Whichever way we celebrate or observe Veterans Day, it is still very much a day when other nations such as Britain

or Belgium, where it is called Remembrance Day, it is a solemn ceremony remembering an entire generation of young men who lost their lives in a war to end all wars, as a more innocent time believed.

Walter Junkel 04/22/1926–10/30/2022

Walter Junkel, a 1st generation American, was born November 22, 1926 in Kenosha Wisconsin. He later moved to California with his wife Marion and sons where he ran a successful paint contracting business with his brother and sons for over 50 years. He loved Jazz, loved to play the trumpet, was a Boy Scout leader for many years and an active member of the VFW Post 2805. Walter was also recently honored by participating with Honor Flights in Washington DC.

Walter was preceded in death by his wife Marion, his two brothers, Bob and Frank and his son Mark. He is survived by his 4 sons, Paul(Sylvia), Peter, John(Patti), and Matthew(Sharon), his 6 Grandchildren and 13 Great-Grandchildren. Water will be interned at the Bakersfield Veterans Cemetery at a later date. Honorarium in his name to VFW Post 2805.

Walter grew up in Kenosha Wisconsin, son of German and Danish immigrants. Like so many others, he received the call from President Roosevelt to serve in the United States Army during time of war. The year was December 1944. He answered the call and was inducted into general military service in January of 1945 at the young age of 18 years and 2 months. He reported to basic training at Camp Robinson Arkansas completing this in May of 45. Soon after, Walter was told to pack his gear, "you're headed to Army Language School at Presidio Monterey, CA." to study languages.

Following his tour at language school, SSgt. Junkel was ordered to report to the war in the Pacific Theater.

However, a typhoon delayed the departure until November, 2 months after Japan had surrendered; the war was over.

He arrived in Yokohama Japan aboard the US Army Transport General William Weigel as part of the military government's occupation force. He was assigned to the 8th Army HQ & HQS Company, 88th Military Government Team, Fukushima Japan and was part of the Public Health Section. His unit was tasked with setting up and maintaining public health for the GI's and the local population. Dysentery and malaria were rampant so his unit was responsible for disinfection of health care facilities, spraying for mosquitos and training the local population on sanitary practices.

During his time in Japan, Walter was selected to be part of the honor guard to accompany Emperor Hirohito. Although the Emperor was more of a figurehead to the United States he was worshiped as a god by the Japanese people. Walter's guard unit would escort the emperor during trips around the local prefecture.

Walter was fascinated by the people, culture and country of Japan. He truly enjoyed helping them restore after the war. Given this, he reenlisted for another tour in 1946. He considered staying in the Army as a career but was weary of the conflict that was brewing in Korea. In the end he figured he was lucky once but didn't want to chance it a second time. He was Honorably discharged in 1949.

Sam Schultz 11/11/1923-11/16/2022

Samuel Schultz, was born in Brooklyn, NY on Veterans Day, November 11, 1923.

Schultz enlisted in the U.S. Army in July 1942 and deployed to England with the 385th Anti Aircraft Separate Battalion.

After four months, the unit was sent to Utah Beach, July 7, 1944, to protect the Normandy beaches from enemy aircraft.


Fighting their way across France, Holland, Belgium, and Germany they protected Army units at bridges and airfields on their drive to Germany. Then, the 385th moved into Belgium where they were involved in the Battle of the Bulge.

After the Battle of the Bulge, the 385th went through Holland and Germany where they stayed through the end of the war.

Schultz' awards are numerous: The French Legion of Honor medal, presented by the Minister of Foreign Affairs (the highest French order of merit for military and civil merits established in 1802 by Napoleon Bonaparte), the EAME Campaign Medal with four battle stars (EuropeanAfrican-Middle Eastern campaign medal created in 1942 by President Franklin D. Roosevelt), the WWII Victory Medal, the American Campaign Medal, and the Belgium Fourragere (created by Prince Charles of Belgium in 1940 to honor certain military formations distinguished during WWII).

After the war, he and his wife, Ruth, moved to Los Angeles where he became an electrician and then a journeyman in 1950. He worked for an electric company for 17 years and then for the County of Los Angeles for 20 years. Later, he did volunteer work for Kaiser Hospital in Woodland Hills and Panorama City for 26 years.

Sam has three children, three grandchildren and four great grandchildren. He and Ruth enjoyed 72 years of happiness together.





Howard Davis 07/07/1936-11/17/2022

Howard A. Davis grew up in Cumberland, Maryland. In 1954, he graduated from Fort Hill High School and 0n 18th birthday, July 7, 1954, he enlisted in the USAF.

He took his Basic Training at Sampson AFB, NY. Then he was sent to Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, TX, to train as a Medic. Upon completion of training, he was assigned to Spangdahlem Air Force Base, Germany. At the base hospital, his duties included the Treatment Room and Night Emergency. In addition, he was also assigned as a paramedic on flying status.

His next assignment was to a base in New York City and he was discharged. Upon returning to Cumberland, Maryland, he kept busy working at different occupations. Then he enrolled in Frostburg State Teachers College in Western Maryland and completed his studies in two years. Years later he received his A.A. from Los Angeles Valley College in the Administration of Justice. He also earned a B.A. in Management from Redlands University.
