

Condor Squadron's WWII-era planes take to the skies at Van Nuys Airport

The fundraiser honors members Chris Rushing and Randy Sherman, who tragically died flying

The fearless fliers of the Condor Squadron recently took to the skies at Van Nuys Airport in authentic WWII North American AT-6 airplanes at a fundraiser honoring two of their late members who died while flying.

Squadron members fly the vintage airplanes in parades, celebrations, and memorials to recognize the sacrifices and heroism of America's WWII veterans and those who have served America over the years. On June 15, they held their "Keep 'em Flying" fundraiser to ensure the nonprofit has the funding to keep their aging aircraft airborne.

This year's event was dedicated to longtime squadron president Chris Rushing of Thousand Oaks and former squadron pilot Randy Sherman of Los Angeles. Both had a profound passion for aviation and community service, and both died while flying.

Rushing led the Condor Squadron in its mission to preserve military aviation heritage for years, flying hundreds of memorial flights in honor of veterans and in support of community causes. Tragically, Rushing died in a midair collision at the National Championship Air Races in Reno in September 2023.

Sherman, a noted plastic surgeon in Los Angeles, sadly died in July 2023 after an engine failed on his Cessna airplane in New Mexico. In addition to flying with the Condor Squadron formation team, Sherman was a board member for the Santa Monica Museum of Flying, the Lyon Air Museum, and the American Air Museum.

How Many WWII Veterans Are Still Alive

As we approached the 80th anniversary of D-Day, we watched a nine-minute video documented by British historian Dr. Mark Felton. In it, Felton discussed his research on how many World War II veterans are still alive in both the Allied and Axis countries.

The United States had the largest number of living veterans at 119,550, with a projection of less than 1,000 by 2035. Other countries with significant numbers of living veterans included Japan, India, Russia, Germany, Great Britain, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. Dr. Felton

also highlighted the importance of recognizing the sacrifices made by these veterans and noted that many had passed away in recent years.

Dr. Felton's study was conducted in January 2024 and estimates that 131 are drying every day.

The Battle of Normandy: 85 Days in Hell

The featured presentation on June 3, 2024, was the History Documentary titled *The Battle of Normandy: 85 Days in Hell.*

The Battle of Normandy: 85 Days in Hell is a gripping documentary that delves into the Allied forces' monumental D-Day landing in Normandy, France, marking the beginning of a fierce 85-day campaign to defeat German troops and free France. The series stands out for its extensive use of previously unseen archival footage, providing a vivid, rarely-seen glimpse into the heart of the battle and the strenuous efforts to liberate Europe. It encapsulates the courage and chaos of this pivotal period.

The documentary detailed the complexities and challenges of the Allied operation 'Overlord,' which aimed to liberate Normandy from German occupation in 1944. The discussion described the fierce battle that ensued, including the initial landing on June 6th, 1944, and the subsequent efforts to advance and push back German forces. It highlighted the significant obstacles faced by the Allies, such as entrenched German defenses, the destruction of supply lines, and the challenges posed by weather and terrain. Despite these difficulties, the Allies were able to achieve their objectives, linking up their forces and securing key locations, although the battle continued to be a grueling and costly one.

The narrator detailed the brutal and prolonged battle of Normandy during World War II. The Allied forces, consisting of American, British, and Canadian soldiers, faced immense resistance from the German army, particularly in the dense hedgerows of the Bocage region. Heavy casualties, intense shelling, and the use of tactics such as white phosphorous fire marked the fight.

After weeks of grueling combat, the Allies liberated the city of Saint-Lo, but at a high cost. The narrator emphasized the significant loss of life and the immense destruction inflicted on the region, highlighting the sacrifices made by soldiers on both sides.

The narrator then discussed the battle of Normandy, focusing on the physical and psychological toll it took on soldiers and the strategies employed by both sides. They highlighted the effectiveness of Operation Cobra in disrupting the German defenses and the significant role played by General Patton in advancing Allied forces toward the south of Normandy. The narrator also recounted the German counterattack, Operation Lutik, which was ultimately unsuccessful, leading to the defeat of German forces in Normandy by mid-August 1944.

The documentary recounted the intense battles that took place during the Normandy invasion, detailing how the Allied forces, led by the US, the British, and the Canadian troops, managed to push back the German forces and ultimately close the Falaise Gap. The narrator noted the significant loss of life and equipment on both sides, with the Allies suffering 220,000 casualties and the Germans losing over 200,000 soldiers. The narrator also highlighted the role Normandy played in the overall Allied victory and the eventual rebuilding of the region.

The Douglas DC-3: The Plane That Flew For Almost A Century

The featured presentation on June 10, 2024, was a video titled *The Douglas DC-3: The Plane That Flew For Almost A Century*. With more than 16,000 built, the DC-3 became the world's most successful aircraft and legend in several wars. During both World Wars, the military version of the DC-3 became a crucial factor for success. But by now, the Basler factory in Oshkosh near Chicago seems to be an airplane boneyard. Several DC-3 aircraft seem to be

lying about in disrepair. But through 45,000 hours of work, 80 employees hammer, screw, and drill a wreck into a modern aircraft. The DC3 is the only aircraft in the world that can be fully rejuvenated after 80 years of service and then continue to fly for another 50 years or more.

The narrator introduced the presentation on the DC3, an airplane with nearly a century-long history that began as a civilian transport plane and was used as a military aircraft during World War II and the Cold War. He highlighted the DC3's various roles, its transformation into a commercial airliner, and its enduring popularity due to its unique design and history. The narrator also discussed the significance of the DC3 in Switzerland's history, its restoration by local enthusiasts, and the ongoing efforts to restore a vintage DC3. The conversation concluded with a comparison to the ambitious dreams of Swiss entrepreneur Ugomatis and the emergence of a new era in aviation production in Santa Monica.

The narrator discussed the crucial role played by the C. 47 military transport aircraft in World War II. The plane was requisitioned in large numbers in December 1941 and supplied to allies, especially Great Britain and the Soviet Union. The aircraft was used extensively during the D-Day invasion, aiding the transport and supply of thousands of paratroopers. The plane's reputation for carrying whatever was needed led to it being dubbed the "workhorse of the war." The narrator also noted that the C. 47 played a significant role in allowing the Allies to overcome German defenses and advance inland. The plane's success led to it being hailed as a legend of the war, and its rediscovery after being misidentified for years was celebrated as a significant historical discovery.

Roy Owens, an expert on vintage plane engines, inspected the radial engine and determined that all 14 cylinders were beyond repair, requiring replacement. With the help of his friends, Roy builds new engines from 80-year-old spare parts, demonstrating the significant history of aviation. The discussion also highlighted the importance of the DC-3 plane, which played a significant role in the Berlin Airlift of 1948-1949, providing essential supplies and winning the hearts of the West Germans. The DC-3 has been versatile, serving various purposes, including cargo transport, passenger travel, and military operations. It is now being used for climate data research through polar research, with maintenance plans and a delivery contract in place.

Duke Dao Provides Crime Statistics

On June 17, 2024, LAPD Senior Lead Officer Duke Dao briefed the group about a recent residential burglary trend by a Chilean crew that drives around with high-end vehicles to match your neighborhood, like BMW, Lexus, and Mercedes. They are usually a group of 4 or 3. What they do is they drive up, and a female knocks on your door, and the car takes off, and then later they drop off another two and break into your house, usually by the side gate, and smash the patio slider. Most sliders don't have alarms.


They operate south of the Boulevard from Mulholland to West LA. They do their thing, and then they take off to leave the country. It's really hard to track them, and cameras do not deter them because they're using countersurveillance in the neighborhood, whereby they would drop off a camera. Well, you know, within the bushes and stuff, we have not seen it. However, we have a report of it.

When asked about car break-ins, Duke said that gangs from South LA learn how to get into a make and model and then roam the valley to find that make and model and break into or outright seal the car.

Duke highlighted new tactics employed by criminals, emphasizing the importance of neighborhood watch programs and the use of security cameras. Duke also touched upon challenges related to tracking reports and addressing homelessness issues, as well as a recent shooting incident in Oxnard.

Lastly, he expressed concern over the lack of candidates interested in becoming police officers.

The Secord World Wars – How the First Global Conflict Was Fought and Won with Victor Davis Hanson

On June 17, 2024, the featured presentation was a video of a discussion of Hoover Institution Historian Victor Davis Hansen's book *The Second World Wars – How the First Global Conflict Was Fought and Won*.

Micheal Auslin from the Hoover Institution led a discussion with Victor David Hanson (VDH) on his book. (continued page 8)

World War II was the most lethal conflict in human history. Never before had a war been fought on so many diverse landscapes and in so many different ways, from rocket attacks in London to jungle fighting in Burma to armor strikes in Libya.

The Second World War examines how combat unfolded in the air, at sea, and on land to show how distinct conflicts among disparate combatants coalesced into one interconnected global war. Drawing on 3,000 years of military history, VDH argues that despite its novel industrial barbarity, neither the war's origins nor its geography were unusual, nor was its ultimate outcome surprising. The Axis powers were well prepared to win limited border conflicts, but once they blundered into a global war, they had no hope of victory.

Micheal Auslin led VDH to a discussion about various aspects of World War II, particularly focusing on technological innovations and their practical applications. The conversation touched on topics like the importance of transparent governments in facilitating technological advancements, the value of different types of weaponry, and the role of innovation in war.

The discussion focused on the strategic mistakes made by the Axis powers during World War II, particularly Germany and Japan, and how these missteps contributed to their eventual defeat. VDH highlighted the importance of innovation, pragmatism, and strategic thinking in achieving victory, citing examples of Allied collaboration and technological advancements. He also emphasized the role of autocratic decision-making in hindering innovation and flexibility in the Axis powers.

Micheal Auslin led a discussion on the lessons that can be learned from the events of World War 2. VDH highlighted the importance of understanding the historical context and the mistakes made by both the Axis powers and the Allies. He emphasized the role of the US as an expeditionary force and its innovative approach to warfare, particularly in terms of logistics and mobility. The discussion also touched on the potential parallels between the current situation and the events of the past, particularly in terms of the potential for a war with China. The conversation ended with an open discussion on the topic.


Sebastian Gorka, a professor, asked VDH to discuss detailed American foreign policy strategies since 1989, focusing on their successes and failures. VDH highlighted the importance of understanding the mission, agenda, and investment required for any foreign policy intervention. He also discussed the challenges faced, such as the lack of clear strategic vision and the tendency towards over-intervention in conflicts. He emphasized the need for a more nuanced approach to foreign policy, focusing on principles of realism and avoiding the pitfalls of naivety and arrogance.

VDH discussed how the US military's technological advancements and legal constraints have hindered innovation during recent wars compared to World War II.

He emphasizes the need for disproportionate force and unpredictability as deterrents and attributes many World War II casualties to the Axis powers' attacks on civilians. VDH argues that World War II served to correct misperceptions about the relative strengths of nations, something that better communication could have prevented. He critiques some strategic decisions made by Allied leaders during the war.

Victor Davis Hanson's books are well worth reading.


That was the total event of that D-Day celebration in France. What a hell of a thing that is, anyway! I'm disappointed. Yes, I'm disappointed.

United States Antarctic Program by Sam Feola

On June 24, 2024, the featured presentation was a talk by Sam Feola, former Manager of the United States Antarctic Program. Sam started as a US Navy helicopter pilot supporting the program and, after leaving the Navy, joined Raytheon and rose to the position of overall manager of the program.

Sam led a detailed discussion about Antarctica, focusing on the United States Antarctic Program and its taxpayer funding. The Sam shared their personal experience working in Antarctica and provided insights into the unique characteristics of the continent, such as it being the driest, coldest, windiest, and emptiest continent. The discussion also covered the logistics of traveling to Antarctica, the role of the Antarctic Treaty in governing scientific cooperation and prohibiting military activity, and the US National Science Foundation's management of the Antarctic program. The conversation concluded with a brief history of exploration and the current summer population at McMurdo Station.



Sam then provided a comprehensive overview of the facilities and operations at two Antarctic research stations. They showcased the dormitories, utilities, and storage facilities, highlighting the extensive recycling efforts and the use of sea ice for aircraft landing. Sam also demonstrated the research laboratories, including the Prairie Lab and the largest scientific laboratory in the United States. They discussed the challenges of helicopter landing, the pristine air quality, and the construction and design of the new South Pole Station, built by Raytheon in 2009. Sam also explained the unique challenges of obtaining water and managing waste at the South Pole, emphasizing the station's design to withstand the harsh environment.

Next, Sam discussed their role in facilitating a doctor's research on breast cancer and detailed the various modes of transportation used in extreme environments, particularly focusing on the logistics in Antarctica. He also provided an in-depth overview of Antarctica's history, highlighting the expeditions of Robert Falcon Scott and Ernest Shackleton and the scientific research being conducted in the region, including studies on penguins, seals, and climate change.

Sam shared a captivating tale about Emperor penguins, their rescue from Antarctica, and the challenges faced during their transportation to the United States. The penguins were captured by the National Science Foundation, in collaboration with Seaworld, for research purposes. The first attempt ended in a fire that killed all the penguins caught initially, but the operation continued for two more years. Sam described the difficulties of catching the agile penguins and the importance of keeping them at the appropriate temperature while in transit. They also highlighted the natural predators of penguins and shared unique insights into their deep-sea diving expeditions and the antifreeze properties of Antarctic blood.







He led a wide-ranging discussion on various topics related to astrophysics and the Antarctic region, highlighting the unique conditions at the South Pole that enable telescopes to discover new galaxies and the IceCube telescope's role in studying neutrinos. They also discussed the operations of their contracting company providing services in remote locations like the South Pole, as well as the risks involved, such as carbon monoxide poisoning. The conversation touched on the rapid melting of ice at the

South Pole, the challenges of operating equipment in extreme cold, and the possible impact of volcanic activity on the region.
