



On October 7, 2024, Ed Reynolds presented Chip Stevens with a Wings Over Wendy's 15-year Faithful Attendance Plaque and Los Angeles City Council Certificate of Achievement. Chip was out of town on business when the Wings Over Wendy's Awards Luncheon took place.



America's Most Realistic Submarine Documentary: The People's Choice Winner!

The featured presentation on October 7, 2024, was a documentary on USN submarines. It was created by the first civilian film crew to be authorized to go to sea on a USN Nuclear Submarine cruise.

The documentary focused on the daily life and challenges of the United States Navy's submarine patrol crew. It discussed the crew's communication, camaraderie, and living conditions in a confined space. The importance of secrecy and stealth in their mission was emphasized, with a drill demonstrating their independent warfare capabilities. The sub's Captain highlighted the need for absolute confidence in the crew's abilities and the importance of the Captain's role in piecing together all the information provided by the crew.

The narrator discussed the importance of morale and character in naval warfare, particularly in submarine operations. He shared personal experiences of submarine life and highlighted the challenges faced by submarines during World War I and II. The documentary also discussed the evolution of submarines in naval warfare, the introduction of the Nautilus, and the significant role of Hyman G. Rickover in US military history. The narrator also shared his experience with an uncomfortable interview process and reflected on the legacy of Admiral Rickover.

The documentary also focused on the training and selection process for submariners in the Navy, emphasizing the importance of intelligence and extensive training in damage control. The Navy has developed an apprentice system and simulators to prepare sailors for the intricacies of submarining. The psychological stress involved in submarine duty was acknowledged, and the importance of teamwork and quick decision-making was highlighted. The conversation ended with a demonstration of a damage control wet trainer and a discussion on the unique aspects of being part of a submarine crew. A mock fire drill was also conducted on the submarine as part of regular training.

The documentary discussed the challenging and dangerous nature of working on submarines, emphasizing the dedication and commitment of the crew. It was noted that many crew members come from broken homes and seek a sense of family and belonging on the submarine. The narrator also highlighted the difficulty of maintaining communication with families during long patrols, with messages often being brief and cryptic. The importance of these messages in keeping morale high and reminding the crew of their loved ones at home was emphasized. The conversation also touched on the mental toll of being isolated and unable to share details, likening it to having a hard shell built up. The crew tracks potential enemy submarines through sound analysis and deduction, which is described as challenging but fun. The tense nature of modern submarine warfare with long-range weapons was contrasted with previous eras, exploring the unique psychological and tactical aspects of submarine life.

Mike Soscia, a former Major League baseball player and manager, shared his background, emphasizing the importance of competition and hard work and expressing his appreciation for the veterans in the room.

He shared his journey of being recruited by Clemson University and the Los Angeles Dodgers and his decision to pursue his college education. He had wanted to play football at Penn State but was told he was too light and to concentrate on baseball at Clemson. His mother was happy that he was going to college.

Mike then shared a memorable story from his unexpected invitation to play with the Dodgers baseball team in 1976 and his subsequent signing with the team.

He also told us about his emotional goodbye to his family at the airport when he traveled to Walla Walla, Washington, for his first professional baseball game.

He emphasized the importance of self-leadership, sharing personal experiences of being a leader from a young age. They stress that true leadership stems from one's qualities, not titles or uniforms. They highlight the role of family, faith, and community in fostering leadership values.

Mike recounts stories about playing for Tommy Lasorda, the former Dodgers manager known for his competitiveness and religious devotion.

He also clarified a misconception about catching Fernando Valenzuela, stating they had a bond with the pitcher. Mike acknowledges the rule change following Buster Posey's injury and expresses a desire to spend time with grandchildren instead of coaching.


Tom Maiden discussed his career in aircraft development and manufacturing while on the Joint Strike Fighter team at Lockheed Martin, building the F-35,

"Discussion of Historical Fiction Novel Senja Chronicles" by co-author, Christopher M. Allport

Christopher M. Allport was the featured speaker on October 21, 2024. He started by describing the development of the novel *Senja Chronicles*, a historical fiction novel set in Northern Norway inspired by the island's history and mythology.

The book explores the history and culture of the Indigenous Sami people. Chris and Fansu Njie co-wrote the book with the help of a Netflix grant and published it by Alpha Command Unit Press.

Over the years, Fansu and Chris had worked together on several horror scripts for the European market.

Chris wrote that collaborative writing can be either extremely frustrating or bountifully fruitful. Knowing this going in the front door, Fansu and I were delicate and careful to respect each other's creative process. In the rare event that we ever came to a crossroads in which we did not agree, Fansu and I had a clear plan to resolve the creative difference. Each of us would have an opportunity to present our side to the other and argue our case. If neither could successfully convince the other that our one particular way was the way to go, then we would scrap both ideas, back up to the point that we last agreed, and be required to throw fresh ideas on the table.


Sami are an Indigenous polar people with a global population of about 80,000 to 100,000. They reside in the northern parts of Scandinavia and some parts of Russia.

Similar to the Inuit people of Alaska, who are often referred to as 'Eskimos' (which can be considered derogatory), the term' Laplander,' as Sami were historically known, is also regarded as offensive.

Sami languages are classified as a branch of the Uralic language family, which is spoken by approximately 25 million people, predominantly in Northern Eurasia.

Traditionally, the most common Sami livelihoods include nomadic reindeer herding, sheep herding, coastal fishing, and fur trapping.

Today, about ten percent of Sami people remain connected to reindeer herding — which actively provides meat, fur, and transportation. For traditional, environmental, cultural, and political reasons, reindeer herding has been legally reserved for only Sami in some regions of the Nordic countries.



Map of the Sapmi (Lapland) Area





October 28, 2024



35th Annual Admiral Nimitz Symposium

On October 28, 2024, the featured presentation was a recording of Jonathan Parshall's lecture "**1942 The Perilous Year**" at the 35th Annual Admiral Nimitz Symposium—2022.

Jonathan Parshall is a WWII Military Historian, an expert on the Japanese Navy, and a familiar face to Wings Over Wendy's. We have seen his summary of his book *Shattered Sword: The Untold Story of the Battle of Midway*" and other lectures.

In this lecture, Jon discussed the challenges faced by the Allies during the first half of 1942, particularly in the Mediterranean and Pacific theaters. The British Empire was losing territories, and the Royal Navy was struggling to counter the German U-boat threat. In the Pacific, Japan's military campaign was advancing rapidly, with the capture of key territories and the sinking of numerous Allied ships.

He also highlighted the interconnectedness of the various theaters of the war, noting that the fall of France in 1940 contributed to the fall of Singapore in 1942 and that the struggle for resources between the British and Americans played a significant role in the war's progression.

Jon also discussed China's critical role during World War II, particularly its role in tying down Japanese troops and its impact on the Soviet Union's ability to fight the Germans.

He addressed the concept of Eastern Front determinism, arguing that the Eastern Front did not solely determine the outcome of the war. Instead, he emphasized the importance of other factors, such as the United States' rearmament, the failure of the Germans and Japanese to marshal their resources efficiently, the survival of the Soviet home front, and the rapid increase in the quality of Allied military performance. Jon concluded by emphasizing the importance of shipping and logistics in modern warfare and how the loss of territories and resources affected the overall war effort.

During the Q&A with the audience, Jon touched on the importance of the Pacific theater in the war, stating that it was crucial in determining the outcome of the conflict. He added that for every book or historical paper written about the Pacific theater, there are four or five books or historical papers written about the European theater, especially the Normandy Invasion and the Battle of the Bule. The lecture ended with a discussion on the impact of different government types on the war.

Judge allows UCLA to resume using baseball stadium on VA grounds The university has agreed to pay \$600,000 for access to Jackie Robinson Stadium until the end of the 2025 baseball season

UCLA is set to resume temporary use of its previously shuttered baseball stadium on the Veterans Affairs grounds in West Los Angeles on Tuesday after reaching an agreement with a federal judge about placing emergency housing for needy vets in adjacent parking lots.

U.S. District Judge David Carter wrote in an order filed Monday that since UCLA has agreed to pay \$600,000 to the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs within two weeks, the court will allow UCLA access to Jackie Robinson Stadium until the end of the 2025 baseball season.



The temporary lease, also covering the small adjacent practice field and concessions and training facilities within the stadium, will extend no later than July 4, the judge wrote.

"The stadium and practice field land may be needed in the future if VA continues to argue, contrary to the court's findings, that there is insufficient space available for veteran housing on the campus," according to the order. "After July 4, 2025, the land on which the baseball facilities sits may be used for housing. If UCLA is unable to reach a new agreement with VA by that date, UCLA will lose access."

The judge previously signed an emergency declaration, finding disabled and homeless veterans in urgent need of shelter as the rainy season approaches. "All efforts by the parties should focus on providing immediate shelter on the grounds of the campus before approaching winter conditions," Carter wrote.

As a result, two designated paved parking lots near the stadium will become active construction sites within three weeks as work begins on the placement of electrical and sewage lines and the forthcoming construction of modular units, the judge wrote, with on-site assessments already underway.

Carter's Oct. 7 emergency order held that "with fall and winter approaching and with thousands of homeless veterans still living on the streets, an emergency exists."

The developments stem from the month-long trial in August of a lawsuit lodged in Los Angeles federal court against the VA by a group of unhoused veterans with disabilities, challenging land lease agreements and seeking housing on the campus for veterans in need, many of whom are homeless or must travel for hours to see their doctors. The judge, an 80-year-old Vietnam War veteran, found for the veterans.

During the non-jury trial, the VA argued that it is out of space on its 388-acre campus, and that the lack of available acreage precludes any increase to the 1,200 housing units the agency promised to open by 2030. VA attorneys alleged that any relief ordered by the court would burden the department financially and deprive it of the flexibility needed to solve veteran homelessness.

Ultimately, the court found that veterans are entitled to more than 2,500 units of housing at the campus. After finding that land-use agreements with UCLA's baseball team, the affluent Brentwood School, an oil company, and other private interests on the West Los Angeles campus were illegal, Carter terminated the leases.

The court is currently devising "exit strategies" for former tenants in order to ensure the land — including 10 acres leased to UCLA and 22 acres contracted to the Brentwood School — is put to a use that principally benefits veterans.

The judge last month directed the VA to build up to 750 units of temporary housing within 18 months and to form a plan to add another 1,800 units of permanent housing to the roughly 1,200 units already planned under the settlement terms of an earlier lawsuit.

Carter held that for years the VA — budgeted at \$407

billion annually — has "quietly sold off" land badly needed for homeless military veterans.

VA sees record rise in benefits delivery but promises even more

Veterans Affairs officials on Tuesday announced record-high levels of medical care delivery and disability benefits payouts in fiscal 2024, but also promised to push those marks even further in coming months with efforts to broaden support for veterans.

"By nearly every metric, VA is smashing records that we had set last year," VA Secretary Denis McDonough said during his annual pre-Veterans Day report on department progress at the National Press Club in Washington. "That means even more care, even more benefits to even more veterans."

On the medical front, VA saw its highest level of health care appointments ever in fiscal 2024: about 127.5 million, up 6% over the previous fiscal year.

Some of that was driven by the 2022 adoption of the PACT Act, which eased eligibility for medical care and disability benefits for a host of military toxic exposure issues. More than 796,000 veterans have enrolled in VA health care in the last two fiscal years, up 37% from the previous 24 months.

On the benefits side, the department processed 2.5 million disability benefit claims in fiscal 2024, a 27% increase over fiscal 2023. Roughly 6.7 million veterans and survivors received \$187 billion in benefits last year, another department record.

Officials also saw increases in the number of dental care appointments (6 million, up 9% over fiscal 2023), calls fielded by the Veterans Crisis Line (1.1 million, up 12% from fiscal 2023) and caregiver assistance services (88,095, up 19% from fiscal 2023).

McDonough said the high level of activity points to success in aggressive outreach efforts by the department in recent years and helps justify the growing size of the VA workforce, which topped 450,000 workers last fiscal year.

VA has already granted presumptive condition status for several other illnesses related to base contamination. That move makes it easier for veterans to apply for and receive disability benefits, eliminating paperwork requiring proof of a link between military service and sicknesses later. VA officials have said they are already about \$12 billion short of funding they need for fiscal 2025 to keep pace with the increase in demand from veterans and survivors. Lawmakers are expected to consider a funding boost when they return from their legislative break next month.


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
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
