Wings Over Wendy's Meetings Require a Team

As attendees start arriving between 9:00 and 9:30 every Monday, a team of volunteers has been busy setting up the Auditorium for the meeting since the High School opened the parking lot and doors at 8:00 am.

David Greenberg is usually the first to arrive, and he opens the closet in the back of the Auditorium to move out the chair rack and the folded display.

Karen and Tim Valarde, Barry Chapman, and Mark Ax join David as early arrivers, but they go to a closet in the Teacher's Lounge to retrieve the equipment needed to make coffee for the attendees.

Soon after David's arrival, David Tostenson, John Boliko, Dave Steinbacher, and Bill Ratner arrive and start retrieving tables from the Auditorium closet and setting up three rows of tables and chairs.

David opens the side door and gate for Ed Reynolds to bring in the computers and the briefcase of materials for the meeting. Ed and/or David open the box of WOW electronic and meeting equipment and spread the tablecloth across the tables on the stage. The sound equipment rack is then set up and connected to power, as well as the Auditorium sound system and projector. Ed then sets up the WOW laptop and tablets for the Zoom meeting. Barry, Mark, Karen, and Tim set up tables for the donuts and coffee sales. Soon, Phyrun Samit arrives with his young son, Kylie, and delivers the donuts.

At the first meeting of the month, Shirley Andrews distributes the Newsletter. Every meeting, she collects the annual Newsletter Patron fee from those whose fees are expiring.

Additional tables and chairs are set up across the back, and David distributes the raffle tickets to the setup team and attendees as they arrive, starting around 9:00.

Max Carlisle arrives at 9:00 and cross-checks Ed's setup, adjusting the sound levels and connecting the speaker on the back wall to the sound rack. The screen is lowered. If a speaker is scheduled by Bob Eisenhart, when the speaker arrives, Ed or Max loads their presentation onto the WOW laptop.

If no one has scheduled a presentation with Bob Eisenhart, he watches numerous videos and selects one for the featured presentation each week. He sends Ed a message with the video's name and link, which Ed then downloads to the WOW laptop to ensure it will work at the Monday meeting. We enjoy hosting live presentations, and individuals with compelling stories are encouraged to contact Bob Eisenhart to schedule a presentation at a meeting.

Bruce Schults and David Alvarez take orders for hats, shirts, and jackets. Bob Donovan collects comic strips for Operation Gratitude.

If the death of an attendee is reported, Fred Kapan sets up a table with a picture of the deceased. Fred also sets up the raffle items for the meeting's raffle. Marion Lovelace distributed condolence cards to the family of the deceased and arranged for flowers at the funeral.. Marion also obtains roster information from new attendees and writes thank-you letters.

Following the meeting, many members assisted in folding the tables and putting the chairs in the rack. Peter Helm vacuums the floor. David Greenberg delivers the food donated to the local food bank.

Maria Rodriguez is the group's event coordinator. We are always looking for interesting events for the group; please submit your ideas to Maria. Tour ideas should also be submitted to Barry Chapman. Bruce Wiener is the Wings Over Camirrillo Veterans Hangar Chief. Max Carlisle is the float driver and coordinator for the Memorial Day and Veterans Day parade entries. Abe Hoffman on Theodore Roosevelt's Career and Other Episodes in His Colorful Life

The featured presentation on July 7, 2025, was a talk by our resident history professor, Abe Hoffman, on Theodore Roosevelt's career and other episodes in his colorful life.

Abe presented a talk about Theodore Roosevelt's life, focusing on his early career and how he dealt with personal tragedy by moving to Dakota Territory to become a cowboy. After two years of ranching, Roosevelt returned to New York, where he served as Police Commissioner and later as Assistant Secretary of the Navy under President McKinley.

Theodore Roosevelt's military service during the Spanish-American War led to his rise to fame as the leader of the Rough Riders, a volunteer cavalry regiment, and his subsequent political career. After serving as Governor of New York and Vice President, he became the 26th President of the United States following President McKinley's assassination in 1901. During his presidency, he supported the construction of the Panama Canal. He took action against monopolies, but his decision to step down and support William Taft in the 1908 election led to his political downfall. Despite his failed attempt to return as the Progressive Party candidate in 1912, Roosevelt's legacy endures, including his contributions to conservation and his adventurous spirit, which was exemplified by his challenging expedition into the Amazon River.

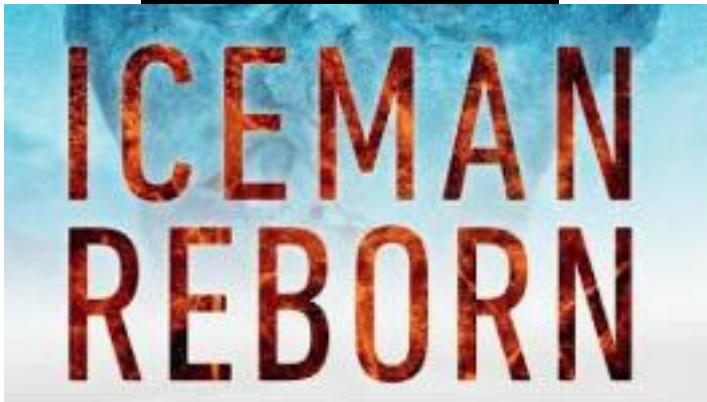
Abe Hoffman then talked about the life story of Abraham "Abe" Hollandersky, a forgotten yet notable figure from history. Born in 1887 to a Polish immigrant family, Abe became a newsboy at a young age and later gained fame as a boxer, despite his functional illiteracy. He was appointed the official newsboy of the Navy by President Theodore Roosevelt, who was impressed by Abe's resilience and initiative. Abe's life took many turns, including acting in silent films, fighting in unconventional matches, and even recruiting sailors during World War II. He self-published a book detailing his life, which went through 25 editions, and was recognized for his contributions to the Navy. The meeting also touched on Roosevelt's conservation efforts and his parade in Washington, DC, highlighting his dynamic presidency.

Ötzi the Iceman: A 5,000-Year-Old True Crime Murder Mystery

On July 14, 2025, the featured presentation was a PBS NOVA video, **Ötzi the Iceman: A 5,000-Year-Old True Crime Murder Mystery**.

He was stalked, attacked, and left to die alone. Murdered more than 5,000 years ago, Ötzi the Iceman is Europe's oldest known natural mummy. Miraculously preserved in glacial ice, his remarkably intact remains continue to provide scientists, historians, and archeologists with groundbreaking discoveries about a crucial time in human history. But in order to protect him from contamination, this extraordinary body has been locked away, out of reach, in a frozen crypt—until now. NOVA joins renowned artist and paleo-sculptor Gary Staab as he has been granted rare access into the Iceman's frozen lair. Gary has been tasked with creating an exact replica of the mummy, allowing scientists and the public to study it up close and in person. As we see the Iceman reborn from 3D printing, resin, clay, and paint, new revelations about Ötzi's life and legacy come to light, including surprising secrets hidden in his genetic code.

The documentary explores Ötzi's significance to science, revealing details about his appearance, health, and cause of death. An artist named Gary Stom is tasked with creating an exact replica of Ötzi for research and public viewing, as access to the original mummy is restricted due to its delicate condition.

The transcript describes the process of creating a life-size replica of Ötzi the Iceman using 3D printing and traditional sculpting techniques. Gary Staub, a master model maker, leads the project, meticulously sculpting and painting the model to match the original mummy's appearance. The process involves using a 3D-printed plastic base, applying clay to recreate skin texture, and

carefully painting to replicate Ötzi's unique features. The transcript also includes information about Ötzi's lifestyle, diet, and the circumstances of his preservation, based on scientific analysis of the mummy.

Researchers have identified 61 tattoos on his body, which may have been used for therapeutic purposes. The mummy's DNA has been analyzed, revealing details about his appearance, health, and ancestry. Ötzi's genetic profile indicates he was descended from early farmers who migrated to Europe from Turkey, with his closest living relatives found in Sardinia. A detailed replica of Ötzi has been created and approved by experts, which will aid further research and education about this important archaeological find.

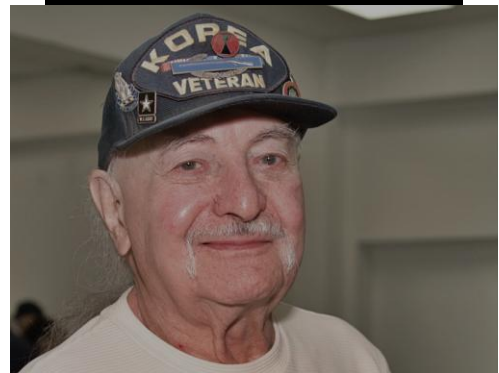

MDMA | Trafficked with Mariana Van Zeller

The featured presentation on July 21, 2025, was the full episode on a National Geographic series conducted by Mariana Van Zeller on MDMA, which is an abbreviation of 3,4-methylenedioxymethamphetamine, also called "Molly" or "Ecstasy," is a lab-made (synthetic) drug that has effects similar to stimulants like methamphetamine.

The video discussed the illegal production and distribution of MDMA, also known as ecstasy, highlighting the process of manufacturing pills and the business aspects involved. Participants explored the history of MDMA, from its initial creation in 1912 to its use in therapy and its eventual rise as a recreational drug in the 1980s. The conversation also touched on the risks associated with the drug, including its potential for misuse, and the challenges

of sourcing the necessary chemicals for production.

The transcript details a discussion about the history and current state of MDMA production and distribution in Amsterdam, focusing on the experiences of Steve Brown, a former trafficker, and Piggy, a current dealer. Brown explains how MDMA became popular in Amsterdam in the 1980s and how he initially got involved in selling it. Piggy describes his current operation, shipping ecstasy to the US through various methods, and discusses the lenient legal environment in the Netherlands compared to the US. The conversation highlights the ease of MDMA production and distribution in Amsterdam due to lenient laws and the challenges faced by law enforcement in the US.

The discussion also focused on the violent and criminal aspects of the drug trade, particularly in the Netherlands, where MDMA production and trafficking have become a billion-dollar business. The conversation highlighted the increasing violence in the drug underworld, including the murder of renowned crime journalist Peter R. Devries, and the intimidation of journalists and lawyers involved in high-profile cases. The participants discussed the impact of encrypted communication tools like Encrochat, which allowed law enforcement to monitor criminal activities, and the growing international connections between drug trafficking groups. The conversation also touched on the casual attitude towards violence in the drug trade and the lack of consequences for criminal actions, as well as the role of users in funding these criminal organizations.

How a POW humming 'Old McDonald' at Hanoi Hilton saved lives

During his initial capture in 1967, US sailor Douglas Hegdhal quietly began to collect vital information, covertly communicating with fellow POWs, memorizing the names, capture dates, and personal details of approximately 256 other American prisoners. (US Information Agency)

He couldn't recall how he had gotten there — all Douglas Hegdahl could remember was leaving behind his glasses in his bunk and going up to the top deck of the cruiser Canberra to watch the ship firing its guns off the Gulf of Tonkin.

“I can’t tell you how I fell from my ship,” Hegdahl said after his release in 1969. “All I know is, I walked up on the deck. It was dark and they were firing, and the next thing I recall I was in the water.”

Picked up by a North Vietnamese fishing boat after treading water for hours, and handed over to the Viet Cong before being brought to Hỏa Lò Prison, also known as the Hanoi Hilton.

It was there that the 20-year-old sailor from Clark, South Dakota, began one of the greatest non-combatant cons of the war.

Deemed a low-value prisoner due to his low rank, Hegdahl began to exploit this perception.

“I had probably the most embarrassing capture in the entire Vietnam War,” Hegdahl said in a 1997 interview with author and veteran Marc Leepson. “I found that my defense posture was just to play dumb. Let’s face it, when you fall off your boat, you have a lot to work with.”

Pretending to be illiterate and suffering from a cognitive disability, Hegdahl's ruse eventually led to his captors giving the American prisoner of war more leeway

within the harsh confines of the prison, which often included regular use of severe torture and harsh interrogation.

Unlike many prisoners who were not allowed to interact with one another, Hegdahl was given more freedom to interact with POWs, which he used to his advantage.

After his initial capture in 1967, Hegdahl quietly began to collect vital information, covertly communicating with fellow POWs, memorizing the names, capture dates, and personal details of approximately 256 other American prisoners, according to the Veterans Breakfast Club.

He developed mnemonic devices, including the nursery rhyme “Old McDonald Had a Farm,” and repeated the information constantly to ensure he would not forget it. He also managed to glean the exact location of the infamous camp.

Dubbed “The Incredibly Stupid One” by North Vietnamese guards, Hegdahl frequently frustrated their attempts to use him for propaganda purposes. Feigning compliance, Hegdahl would read out statements criticizing the US, but they were so laced with errors and the performance so flat that they were rendered unusable by his captors.

I was so mad about their propaganda that it became a personal war to think about how I could mess it up,” Hegdahl recalled in a 1972 interview.

Despite most of the American officers having a “No Go Home Early” pact, Hegdahl was released in 1969 with the support of imprisoned senior officers in order to bring back valuable intelligence to the US government.

His meticulous recall of names provided a comprehensive list of POWs held in Vietnam, including the reclassification of 63 service members previously listed as missing in action to POW.

After his release from the Army, Hegdahl moved to San Diego, but never stopped serving his country. He began working as an instructor in the Survival, Evasion, Resistance, and Escape, or SERE, school in San Diego Bay. One of his students, William J. Dougherty, a CIA officer, was among the 52 hostages held in the US Embassy during the 1979 Iranian Hostage Crisis. Dougherty credits Hegdahl's lectures with helping him keep his "sanity, dignity, and secrets intact."

According to Leepson, Hegdahl's quick thinking and coolness under immense strain should be recognized.

“I think it was one of the most heroic acts not in combat during the Vietnam War,” Leepson told The Independent. “And I think that’s something that people should know.”

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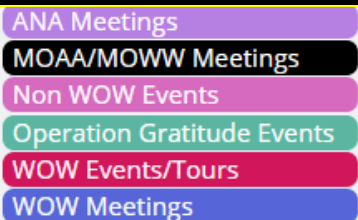

RED Friday is a grassroots movement, with individuals, families, and organizations all participating to show their support for the military.

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
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


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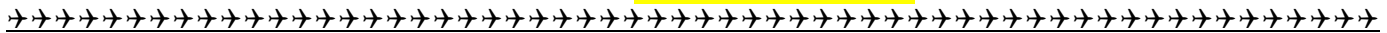
